A week ago while dawdling over a late lunch at an outside cafe in the ancient Alfama, the only section of Lisbon not destroyed in the monster earthquake of 1755, I mentioned to the waitress how much I was enjoying the Fado music. Above the sharp strumming on a guitar, the sadness and lost loves of Portugal pour out of the heart in a strong female voice.

"Esta é a minha musica" she said.

Well as much as I was savouring the moment, it wasn't my music. I drift more toward Harry Chapin, Carlos Santana, The Beatles and The Traveling Wilburys. "You see," she said, handing me a CD of the music we were listening to with her much younger photograph on the cover, "it is my music." This same large lady using a long-handled fork to lift blackened sardines and whole squid off the charcoal fire pit once entertained thousands with her sweet, deep voice. I was so impressed. "Only 15 Euros, Senor," still holding the CD in front of me. I was so being hustled. I told her I'd first like to hear her sing in person. She was performing that evening, just down the street. Unfortunately the Fado clubs don't open until ten and I had a train to catch heading up the coast to Cascais. I asked for a photograph. She went into the restaurant and sent her husband out. Obviously, something got

lost in translation because I now have a photo of me and a famous Fado singer's husband who drinks too much before lunch and gets the orders all screwed up. But the prize in the bottom of the Portuguese Cracker Jack box was Adrian Robson. I was coming down off a cliff walk in the Algarve and onto the beach at Albufeira when a skinny, tanned-toleather Brit was waiting for me at the bottom of the wooden steps. Oh, he saw me coming alright.

"Could I have just two minutes of yer time, mate?"

"Well, I ..."

"Of course you've got two minutes, mate, yer on bloody holiday!"

Then in a heavy, almost Cockney English accent this beach bum in cut-offs and bare feet with three copies of the same black and white paperback books on a blanket began with: "Thank you for coming today." Yeah, like I was a delegate at a vinyl siding convention and he was the guest speaker beginning a one-hour presentation on Termite Detection And Protection.

"I have written this here book. I never had any assertations (I swear he said 'assertations!) of ever writin' a book, but I did jest that because I had to." He brandished a copy of South East Asia - In Yer Face with the cheeriest cover imaginable.

I started to say something and he looked at his wrist like there was a watch on it and said: "Time's not up yet, mate." In great detail, Adrian Robson proceeded

to tell me the story of how he miraculously survived the November 2, 2003 monster flash flood in Bukit Lawang in North Sumatra whereas the village and 239 residents did not. A backpacker, he managed to climb a tree and watch the Bohorok River at his feet destroy 400 houses, 3 mosques, 8 beaches and 35 hotel and guest houses. It was a compelling story of survival. Adrian Robson had cheated death and lived to tell his harrowing tale with no more than the jeans and Doc Martens he was wearing. His travel documents were tied around his neck. Quite often in his presentation he read passages from the book and made references like: "I should be dead, mate," he said, throwing up his hands at about the 15-minute mark of his reading. I should be shot, I thought for getting myself into this debacle, but there was no bailing out now.

"Okay," I said. "I'll buy a book."

"Of course you will, mate. But I ain't done yet." Adrian went on to .....

Even while standing there on

the beach waving money in my hand, he wouldn't give me a book and let me go.

The scene was classically absurd: Adrian the author, me the audience, three sand crabs looking for holes to hide in, a guy from Africa selling wooden carvings walking in between and ... and I thought my last book tour was badly organized!

"I want you to read these here two pages, mate." I felt so ridiculous, I looked around and sort of nervously asked: "You mean out loud." At some point I convinced him my travel visa would expire before the end of his recital so he did let me go. But not before I pulled a pen from my shorts and had him autograph a copy of his book. After which, while making change from my 20 Euro note, he deftly stole my pen.

I must admit it was a very good read with a strong and poignant ending: The F%% !ing End.

Portugal - the land of pleasant surprises and lovable hustlers.

## Recipe

This chicken casserole has the same flavours of chicken parmesan without all the work. It's quick and easy to put together, and can be made ahead in the day for those busy



evenings. The original recipe called for tomato sauce but I prefer the more seasoned marinara sauce you can buy. Feel free to substitute with your favourite tomato or pasta sauce. It's one of those casseroles that you can add or substitute ingredients to suit your taste. I think next time I make it, I'll try adding sautéed mushrooms to the sauce but it's tasty just as it is.

#### **Chicken Parmesan Casserole**

#### Serving Size: 6-8

- I pound ziti you can substitute with penne
- ✤ 2 chicken breasts
- ✤ 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 clove of garlic minced or
  <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp garlic powder
- 1 jar marinara sauce (or favourite tomato/pasta sauce)
- ✤ 2 cups mozzarella cheese
- ✤ 1 cup parmesan cheese
- ✤ 1/4 cup fresh basil, chopped or 1- 2 tbsp dried
- Salt to taste
- Pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Boil pasta for 10 minutes, then drain. Dice chicken breasts. Heat olive oil in a large skillet or pot. Add the chicken with the garlic, season well with salt and pepper, and cook thoroughly. Add marinara sauce, then add cooked pasta and mix until the pasta is coated with sauce. Pour half of the pasta into a greased 11x7-inch or 9x13 inch baking dish. Sprinkle evenly with 1 cup of mozzarella cheese, 1/2 cup of parmesan, and half the required amount of basil. Layer the remaining half of the pasta evenly on top. Sprinkle evenly with the remaining cheese and basil. Bake for 20 minutes, remove and sprinkle immediately with additional Parmesan cheese and fresh basil. Serve warm and enjoy!

## Massey Museum Board Asks Township To **Take Over Building And Operations**



The Massey Area Museum celebrated its grand opening just over two years ago, in September of 2013. Volunteers put in countless hours to ready the museum for its debut. It has been host to the Jessie Burnside Art Show and was the hub of activity when the Pan Am games torch relay made its way through northern Ontario earlier this year. However, there has always been a dark cloud hanging over the well-intentioned museum: funding it.

The financial struggles that the museum has have long been known by residents and Sables-Spanish Rivers Township Council. Council has voted

to direct funds to assist in keeping the museum open when approached, but up until now, has not been asked to fully take over the property. Mayor

Leslie Gamble has kept an open dialog with staff at the museum and has said to them, "Do not come one day and just put the keys to the museum on my desk." The fate of the Massey Area Museum will be the topic of discussion at a special meeting of council on Monday, November 23 at 7:00 p.m. upstairs at the Massey Arena. The museum board has asked that the township consider taking over the property and future operations. The meeting is open to the public and township residents are encouraged to attend.
